



Dino Potty – by Sara Conway

A potty for me: a lift-the-flap instruction manual - by Karen Katz




How to Potty Train a Dinosaur – by Alycia Pace




The Potty Book – by Alyssa Capucilli

Everyone Poops – by Taro Gomi


Shows how creatures throughout the animal world, including humans, deal with the products of digestion.


A New Potty – by Mercer Mayer

Have You Seen my Potty? – by Mij Kelly


